Habitat home 'godsend' for local family of four

Gronenthal receives keys to new house at dedication event

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COLUMBUS - Stacey Gronenthal opened one of the presents she received and pulled out a welcome mat that read "Home Sweet Home."

"I love it," she said as the mat was placed near the front door of the new house she is moving into with her three children.

Gronenthal officially the keys to the home Saturday during a dedication ceremony. She's the sixth person to receive a house through the local Habitat for Humanity chapter.

Tears were shed as the dream of being a homeowner became a reality following months of watching the structure come together.

"It's always been something I wanted to do, but being a single mother of three, the normal payments of a decent house were

always way out of the price range that I could ever afford," Gronenthal said.

She works two jobs, including a full-time position at Archer Daniels Midland. to support a family that includes daughters Jaina, 17, and Avri, 12, and son Malikai, 6. It's a struggle at times to make ends meet.

Gronenthal, 37, said being selected for the newest Habitat build was a godsend.

"Everything happens at a certain time for a certain reason and this was our time," she said.

The family has been living in a trailer home Gronenthal bought six years ago, but it needs repairs. The roof leaks and moisture caused mold to grow in the kitchen.

"It was cheap at the time and a place to call home," she said.

At the urging of a coworker, Gronenthal applied for a Habitat home. It was something she always wanted to do, but never got around to because of her busy schedule.

The family was approved in early January.

Habitat homes are built volunteer using labor, with licensed contractors handling the plumbing, electrical and other work. Homeowners are required to put in about 200 hours of "sweat equity" during the construction process.

The Gronenthal home is a three-bedroom house in the

Habitat homes are usually valued around \$85,000 and funded by donations from companies and individuals. Thrivent Financial paid for half of this build.

Homeowners receive a no-interest mortgage and make monthly payments to the chapter to fund future builds.

Her daughters will share a bedroom until Jaina finishes her senior year at Columbus High School and goes to college. Malikai is getting his own room for the first time.

The new home gives the family a sense of security they didn't have while living in the trailer. The children also have a yard to play in.

"Overall, this is going to be the best thing that's ever happened to us," Gronenthal said.
