"We just outgrew it with all the activities and outreach programs that we have," said Borgman, the church's vouth and Christian education director.

The lease for that location was coming up and grant funding used to cover the rent was about to run out. A decision had to be made on whether to continue operating out of that space, move all the programs and services to the church at 2710 14th St. or find a new location.

"We knew we couldn't move everything back to the church. We could try, but it wouldn't be pleasant," Borgman said.
